'Dr. Hector' in mold of Rev. King

Mexican-Americans often compare Dr. Hector P. Garcia's role to the Rev. Martin Luther King's in the black civil rights movement.

When Garcia was leading the Viva Kennedy movement in the South for John F. Kennedy's presidential candidacy, he brought the same King intensity.

"He was demanding, he was emotional, and above all he was a leader," recalls Tony Bonilia, a Corpus Christi, Texas, lawyer and former state legislator who first met Garcia then.

Today, Garcia, at 70 the elder statesman of Mexican-Americans, will be honored in Washington as one of 14 people receiving the Medal of Freedom — the nation's highest civilian award. He's the first Mexican-American so honored,

Garcia has weathered coronary bypass surgery, but still practices medicine in Corpus Christi's poor West Side and keeps up with politics.

And he'll end the week back in Corpus Christi with Founder's Day celebrations for his American GI Forum.

"I hope when the Lord takes me, he takes me walking — or working," says "Dr. Hector."

Garcia was born in Mexico. His father brought his family to

the USA during the Mexican Revolution.

It was Garcia who attracted attention to a south Texas funeral home that refused its chapel for the funeral of a Mexican-American hometown boy, a war casualty named Felix Longoria.

The reason, Garcia says: "The whites would not like it."

Then-U.S. Sen. Lyndon Johnson saw to it that Longoria was buried in Arlington National Cemetery.

Garcia also led the fight to integrate schools and public facilities for Mexican-Americans in south Texas.

As political king-maker, Garcia has been influential through the GI Forum, founded in 1948 as an advocacy group for veterans.

At election time, Garcia has printed up a facsimile of a ballot, marked his choices and had copies distributed door-to-door to 10,000 households in the Corpus Christi area.

With the ballot comes a let-

ter from Garcia — hammered out by the doctor on the antique typewriter in his office, and signed in his old-fashioned flowery handwriting.
