Dear Hector and Rudy:

The attached letter and qualifications was probably never seen by Cliff Carter. It seems a fellow by the name of Sinclair handled the letter through the previous office of Cliff Carter.

At any rate it was very badly handled I suppose, because the copy of the letter was merely turned over routinely to the USAID and the USAID personnel officer wrote me a letter saying that they had received the letter and could not consider me for a director's position.

The whole thing placed me in a very embarrassing position, especially with the people in USAID Washington. Under no circumstances do I want this situation to occur again. Unless the request is made from the highest level and is really an accomplished fact, I do not want to have the request go through the routine offices of USAID. I think you can easily see the damage that was done because the people above me have now figured that I want over their heads.

The attached letter from Sinclair indicates what took place. Please destroy the letter and keep my own comments on the matter confidential. In the event that you again talk or discuss the matter with Cliff Carter, I would suggest that it be done on a personal basis. I do not need to submit Forms 57 to the AID, they already have my entire record plus the form. What has to be done is for either Carter or the President to take the subject up on a personal basis with Tom Mann. Then let the recommendation filter down to the people in charge of the appointments to the directorships.

Congratulations on the opening of the Washington office. As you know I advanced a \$40.00 check for the first four months of my pledge while in Corpus Christi. I received a notice asking me to send in my pledge, but I am sure you received my check because a few weeks later I got the cancelled check. Have your secretary check this. I will of course send in an additional amount to cover my pledge.

Please say hello to everyone and hope everything is fine.

Dear Mr. Carter:

My visit with you was most pleasant and enjoyable and of course I did not expect for you to take so much of your busy schedule to discuss matters with me. I have related the contents of our discussion to Dr. Hector Garcia and Mr. Sam Fore.

Dr. Garcia will probably follow through with a letter to President Johnson. Mr. Sam Fore was eager to know the reason for my visit with you and expressed a desire to communicate with President Johnson. I promised to send Mr. Fore some background material as well as my ideas of work that should be performed under the Alliance for Progress. Mr. Fore certainly has high regard for you. I also had some pleasant discussions with your friends, Wayne, Merrill, and Godfrey Connally. In fact Godfrey invited me to speak on the Alliance to the Young Democrates of San Antonio College. We had a well attended meeting thanks to Godfrey and Mr. Chance, both Floresville friends of mine.

My desire to become Director of a USAID mission in Latin-America was also made known to Congressman Joseph Montoya. Please be assured that Mr. Montoya, Mr. Morris, and Senator Anderson are acquainted with me through my work with the Unicersity of New Mexico and the GI Forum. I am confident they would endorese or clear any action which would affect my welfare.

In our discussion you indicated a desire to receive a written resume of my background and qualifications. The attached written res me gives most of the details. In gemeral my record really hinges on a part-time NYA job at the University of Texas. That job was made available to me by President Johnson when he was in charge of NYA. Without that NYA jobe I would not have attained college degrees, the rank of AIR Force Major, the position of economics instructor, and my present assignment as program economist for USAID. What I really want to say is that without that NMAA help I would have never attempted a college education at Texas University.
