Dear Senator Yarborough:

The practice of segregating children of migratory workers (all Mexican American) in the public schools of McAllen and other border communities continues -- and, I hear, is to be expanded. This is not only indefensible pedagogically, but it is a violation of constitutional rights. The 1965 $\frac{\text{Hobson } v}{\text{Hobson } case} = \frac{1965}{\text{Hobson }$

Federal funds are being used to underwrite these operations! It is a tragic anomaly that I (and all Mexican Americans) pay taxes to be put in pedagogical concentration camps. I request that you call this matter again to the attention of the Department of Justice and to the Department of HEW. Their prior superficial investigation and directives (if any) has not changed the situation nor discouraged its expansion.

I ask, again, suppose these children were Negroes instead of "migrants"?
