The enclosed brochure describes in some detail a very significant memorial which we hope to create in Hayden Head's honor at The University of Texas at Austin. Because he was deeply dedicated to excellence in education and to his alma mater, a special effort has been initiated to establish an endowed faculty chair in his name at The University's Law School. Under the Regents' Endowed Teachers and Scholars Program, pledges made by August 31, 1989, and fulfilled by August 31, 1991 (four tax years), will be eligible for a dollar-for-dollar match, and a second endowed chair will be established in the College of Liberal Arts. The matching position will be held by the Director of the Plan II Honors Program and will support Plan II student and faculty programs and priorities.

I have concluded that we give our money for the same reason we find it easy to ask others to give money: We believe in the institution and we are committed to it. We feel honored to be a part of it.

My good friend the late Harry Ransom spoke to why people give to The University of Texas in a 1967 speech. He said:

All universities have common obligations and common needs, including the need of private philanthropy. At the last phrase, some of my friends are boggled. They think I mean fund raising. I mean what the word philanthrophy means with inescapable literalness: the love of man and the engagement in the cause of mankind.

I would like to leave you with these thoughts. The footprints most of us leave in the sands of time are pretty shallow. Corollary to this must be another thought, and that is this: Anything we do to make this world a better place for posterity while we pass through on our one-time journey is bound to make the footprints we leave a little deeper. This is true whether we give of our labor or of our material resources.

Is there any better way for you to deepen your footprints for all time to come than by working for or giving to this University? I think not.



Hayden W. Head Memorial Endowments



HAYDEN W. HEAD

Hayden W. Head was born and reared in Sherman, Texas, and received his Bachelor of Arts degree from Austin College in 1934 during the depths of The Great Depression. From an early age, he had his heart set on becoming an attorney. From his grandfather, Judge Henry O. Head, he inherited natural gas stocks that he sold for \$4,000, enough to permit him to go to any law school in the nation, but he selected the one he had always wanted to attend—The University of Texas School of Law. Hayden Head often said that he never regretted selling the stock because his University of Texas education had been of priceless value.

After his graduation from the UT Law School in 1937, he joined a law firm in Corpus Christi. His thriving practice was interrupted when World War II broke out, and he joined the United States Air Corps. By the end of the War, he had achieved the rank of Captain, flying 63 missions over Europe as a pursuit pilot, and had been awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross, the Air Medal with nine Oak Leaf Clusters, and the European Theatre Ribbon with three Battle Stars.

After the War, Hayden Head returned to Corpus Christi to continue his legal career. He became a senior partner in the law firm of Head and Kendrick and made countless contributions to the legal profession, to the State Bar of Texas, and to the American Bar Association. Concurrently, he became an active and successful businessman and served his community with great distinction. His matchless leadership in civic activities was on many occasions applauded and appreciated. Four years ago he was so recognized when the Mayor of Corpus Christi issued a proclamation declaring April 5, 1984, as Hayden W. Head Day.

In recognition of his many contributions, The University of Texas Ex-Students' Association conferred on him its highest honor, the Distinguished Alumnus Award, in 1984.

In further recognition of his strong and continuous commitment to The University of Texas at Austin, President William H. Cunningham presented a Presidential Citation to Hayden Head in April of 1987. This award, the most esteemed honor that The University's President can bestow on individuals of outstanding merit, was for "distinguished service to The University and for distinction in personal and professional life that reflects great credit upon The University."

Hayden Head is survived by his wife, Annie Blake Morgan Head, a son, Judge Hayden W. Head, Jr., and five grandchildren.

THE HAYDEN W. HEAD REGENTS CHAIR IN THE SCHOOL OF LAW

The Hayden W. Head Regents Chair for Faculty Excellence in the School of Law would recognize professors who bring great credit and pride to The University and the Law School through their scholarship, teaching, and service to the state and the nation.

Because excellence is encouraged in all fields of legal study, the Chair would not be limited to any particular area of the law. The selection of the Chair holder would be based on proven ability in the classroom, contributions to the evolution of the law through scholarship, and national recognition as a leader in the profes-

As circumstances dictate, the Hayden W. Head Chair would be awarded annually on a rotating basis to one or more faculty members or, at the discretion of The University, a permanent holder might be appointed. The nature of the Head Chair would permit the Law School to respond to specific and changing curricular and instructional needs, whether they be in tax, oil and gas law, corporate law, property, wills and estates, or other areas.

The University of Texas Law School is recognized as one of the preeminent law schools in the nation. Over its 104-year history, graduates of the UT Law School have become outstanding attorneys, jurists, legal scholars, business and corporate executives, and public sevants who like Hayden Head—evidence a generosity of spirit and devotion of purpose in service to others and the broader society.

THE HAYDEN W. HEAD REGENTS CHAIR IN THE PLAN II HONORS PROGRAM COLLEGE OF LIBERAL ARTS

The Plan II Honors Program, an alternate route to the Bachelor of Arts degree at The University of Texas at Austin, is one of the oldest and most prestigious honors programs in the country. Since its inception in 1935, Plan II graduates have achieved prominence in the professions, academics, business, and the community. The core of the program is a high-quality, interdisciplinary curriculum which features year-long courses, small seminars, independent study, and flexible subject concentrations. Some of The University's finest faculty are selected to teach courses which are designed especially for Plan II students. The program offers the advantages of a major public research university—excellent libraries, world-class faculty, superior facilities, and cultural diversity, as well as the advantages of a small liberal arts college—personal attention, individual advising, and collegiality.

The Hayden W. Head Chair would be held by the Director of Plan II, and the income from the endowment would support special needs associated with the leadership and direction of the honors program.
