
Print and Microform Periodicals Shelved in Call Number Order

The Periodicals Department has stepped into the 21st century by re-shelving print and microform periodicals in order by call number, the same way the rest of the library collections are shelved.

This move improves access to periodicals in a number of important ways. First, because call

numbers are selected based on the subject of the magazine or journal, magazines and journals on the same or similar subjects will be grouped together on the shelf. This should make it much easier to browse through the library's subscriptions by topic. Second, because each journal or magazine or newspaper has its own, unique call number, once you know that call number it will be easier to find it on the shelf. Of course, that means having to look up the magazine



ciation was shelved with magazines and journals that started with the letter J, not with those that started with the letter T. It was also not shelved by its popular acronym, JAMA. Finally, the call number system allows us to place complete runs of a journal or magazine together even when the title changed in mid-run. For example, the journal that

is now called Attention, Perception, & Psychophysics was called Perception & Psychophysics until this year (2009). That meant that if they were shelved alphabetically by title, the volumes published before 2009 would be shelved in the P's and those published after 2009 would be shelved with the A's. Now that they are shelved by call number, all of the volumes of this journal published under either title will be together on the shelf.

New Library Resources: Business and Humanities

The Library is pleased to announce several new resources. In business, the titles from Standard & Poor's are now available online through NetAdvantage. This resource provides access to Stock Reports, Industry Surveys and Bond Reports. NetAdvantage also provides access to updated information on international businesses, mutual funds/ETFs and directories of securities dealers, as well as corporate finances and registries. The Learning Center provides information on financial planning, investing, and retirement. NetAdvantage also provides updated information on the stock market and other business news. click on "Find Articles" and then on "Business". Note: Stock Reports is no longer published in print and is only available through NetAdvantage.

In addition, three online resources in art history are available: Art Full Text, which provides full text articles from 1997; Art Retrospective, which indexes the art literature from 1929 to 1984; and Art Museum Image Gallery, which provides high-quality images of paintings, sculptures, drawings, and other media from museums and collections worldwide.



Special Collections & Archives: Mrs. Hector P. Garcia

It is with much sorrow that the department notes the death on September 20, 2008, of Mrs. Hector P. Garcia, wife of long time Corpus Christi physician and civil rights leader Dr. Hector P. Garcia. She was an important benefactor of Special Collections

& Archives in her own right. With this issue of Infowave, we celebrate Mrs. Garcia's life and note her many contributions to documenting her illustrious husband and the American G.I. Forum.

Mrs. Garcia was born Wanda Fusillo in 1919 in the town of Caserta, Italy. Her mother was from the Italian nobility. Her father was of the educated professional class and a highly respected school president. Mrs. Garcia had three brothers. She was raised and educated in Naples, where she earned a doctorate in classical literature at the University of Naples. She observed the travail of World War II firsthand. While she was employed by the United States military during its occupation of Naples, Wanda met Captain Hector P. Garcia who was stationed there. The couple married in her home church in 1945.

Wanda Fusillo Garcia would join her husband in Corpus Christi in 1946 where he was establishing his medical practice. Dr. and Mrs. Garcia would have four children: Daisy Wanda, Hector, Jr., Adriana Cecilia, and Susana Patricia. Mrs. Garcia was greatly supportive of her husband's civil rights endeavors on behalf of the Mexican American community. She was active in the beginning of the American G.I. Forum. As

their family grew, however, Mrs. Garcia would devote the majority of her time to raising their children. She was nonetheless a familiar presence by his side at many American G.I. Forum functions. She was seen by all as a spouse who helped to make pos-

sible his work on behalf of the community.

Mrs. Garcia was generous to Special Collections & Archives. She donated approximately two hundred cubic feet of Dr. Hector's materials after his death, augmenting what he had conveyed. She and I likewise conducted an important series of oral history interviews about her background as well as her life with her husband in which she offered her unique perspective. Always, she expressed great appreciation to Special Collections & Archives for the manner in which it maintained the Dr. Hector P. Garcia Papers and memorabilia.

Mrs. Garcia was perceptive about civic and political issues. She held an enlightened, progressive worldview. Over my years of association with her, I found Mrs. Garcia to be a refined, gracious, insightful, and educated person. Her presence will be greatly missed,

but like her husband, she will live on in the

records she placed in Special Collections & Archives. It was an honor to have known her and to have called her our friend.
