Dear Dr. Garcia:


This is to acknowledge your letter of September 21 in the interest of Private E-1 Henry Moya who is presently stationed at Fort Knox, Kentucky.


Dear Friend:

Postmaster General Lawrence O'Brien paid tribute to the men and women who have served on the Mississippi River Parkway Commission, for their efforts in linking together the 5,600 mile highway that stretches from Kenora, Canada, on either side of the Mississippi, to Louisiana. This parkway is otherwise known as the "Great River Road." Postmaster O'Brien said that "A trip on this highway is at once a journey into American folklore and American history."

The Red River of Texas is the principal Texas tributary of the Mississippi, and steamboats formerly served Jefferson, Texas, and many points on the Red River in North Texas, from the Mississippi.

The stamp was created by Herbert Bayer of Aspen, Colorado, an internationally known artist, designer and architect. He is a product of the celebrated Bauhaus school in Germany where he studied, taught, and worked with such greats as Walter Gropius and Paul Klee.
