

Distribution/Division of Funds

The distribution of campaign receipts is in the same ratio as each group's average receipts from the Fall 1972 CFC through the Fall 1976 CFC, related to the total receipts reported at the close of those five campaigns. The ratio for each agency is: International Service Agencies 5.25%; United Way 85.89%, and the National Health Agencies 8.86%. You have the privilege of designating your gift to any particular participating agency or agencies. Designated gifts will first be allocated to the appropriate group. Undesignated funds will be added to each group's designations to help achieve its dollar base. Distributions for 1978-79 CFC were made as follows:

The United Way

1. ADA WILSON HOSPITAL OF PHYSICAL MEDICINE AND REHABILITATION serves the orthopedic needs of the children in the Coastal Bend region
2. ALICE BOYS' CLUB provides 625 boys with sports facilities and maintains a library and study room. It gives less privileged boys field trips and supervised recreation.
3. ALICE COUNCIL OF CAMP FIRE GIRLS, INC. is a national youth organization that makes available an educational-recreational program to girls of all races, creeds and economic circumstances.
4. ALICE SALVATION ARMY provides emergency care to transients and homeless individuals and families; offers counseling, transportation and emergency relief to the troubled in the Alice area
5. AMERICAN CANCER SOCIETY seeks to conquer cancer through balanced programs of research, education, patient service, and rehabilitation
6. AMERICAN FIELD SERVICE sponsors a Foreign Exchange student to further international relations.
7. BEE COUNTY CHAPTER, AMERICAN RED CROSS provides relief and assistance from unforeseen disasters. It also offers assistance to servicemen and their families and to veterans
8. BEE COUNTY 4-H CLUBS develop responsibility and leadership to youth from 9 to 19 through home projects and group programs.
9. BEEVILLE BOYS' CLUB provides behavior guidance and promotes the physical, health, social, recreational, educational, vocational, and character development of youngsters.
10. BEEVILLE SALVATION ARMY provides emergency care to transients and homeless individuals and families; offers counseling, transportation and emergency relief to the troubled in the Beeville area.
11. BETHUNE DAY NURSERY helps strengthen family units through various services; day care, extended child care, pre-school educational training, recreation, family and individual consultation, and community involvement
12. BIG BROTHERS/BIG SISTERS OF NUECES COUNTY provides a program that allows a child from a single parent home a relationship with a mature, stable adult.
13. BOY SCOUTS OF AMERICA - GULF COAST COUNCIL promotes the ability of boys to do things for themselves and others, to train them in Scoutcraft, and to teach them patriotism, courage, self-reliance, and kindred virtues, using the methods which are now in common use by Boy Scouts; also helps high-school age boys and girls find their role in the world of work.
14. COASTAL BEND MENTAL HEALTH ASSOCIATION promotes mental health, prevention of mental illness and service to patients and their families - through educational program, social action and referral
15. COASTAL BEND COUNCIL ON ALCOHOLISM promotes development of services by all agencies and individual practitioners for prevention, treatment, and rehabilitation within their areas of competence. Educates the general public on alcohol abuse and alcoholism and the resources available to them.
16. COASTAL BEND HALFWAY HOUSES FOR ALCOHOLICS provides a comprehensive rehabilitation program for Alcoholics.
17. COASTAL BEND LEGAL SERVICES provides legal service in civil matters to qualified low-income residents of Nueces County.
18. COASTAL BEND TEXAS CHAPTER, AMERICAN RED CROSS maintains disaster plans providing relief and rehabilitation from unforeseen disasters. Other programs include services to military, first aid, water safety, youth services and home nursing.
19. COASTAL BEND YOUTH CITY provides residential child care for school age children of all social and ethnic backgrounds in the Coastal Bend Area
20. CORPUS CHRISTI BOYS' CLUB offers social, educational, vocational and character development to less privileged boys; conducts physical training, athletics, dental clinic, arts, crafts and afterschool study sessions.
21. CORPUS CHRISTI COUNCIL OF CAMP FIRE GIRLS provides recreational and character building programs for girls including home-making, outdoor skills, community service, religious growth, swimming, creative arts, family life and spiritual ideals.
22. CORPUS CHRISTI DRUG ABUSE COUNCIL promotes education, prevention and treatment of drug abuse and rehabilitation of the drug addicts.

23. CORPUS CHRISTI HEART ASSOCIATION educates the community to facts concerning heart disease, operates a diagnostic Heart Clinic and works with professionals and volunteers.
24. CORPUS CHRISTI INTERNATIONAL SEAMEN'S CENTER provides recreation, athletic activities, buffets, transportation, sight-seeing and shopping to over 30,000 seamen visiting the Port of Corpus Christi annually.
25. CORPUS CHRISTI SALVATION ARMY provides a community center for activities, a place of worship, a headquarters for the volunteer service programs of adherents and friends of the Salvation Army, a welfare and referral center for the troubled and needy.
26. CRISIS INTERVENTION SERVICE provides immediate crisis intervention to people who seek it, including both telephone and face-to-face intervention; also available to suicidal persons and to prevent suicide through public education.
27. EARLY CHILDHOOD DEVELOPMENT CENTER provides child care for children from 3 weeks of age to 3 years.
28. FAMILY COUNSELING SERVICE assists families who are experiencing stress due to emotional, rational and social causes. Provides training, support, and enhancement to families desiring growth and development in their respective family unit.
29. GIRL SCOUTS - PAISANO COUNCIL inspires girls, grades 1 through 12 with the highest ideals of character, conduct, patriotism, and service to become happy and resourceful citizens.
30. GOODWILL INDUSTRIES OF CORPUS CHRISTI provides employment, training, rehabilitation, and opportunities for personal growth for the handicapped, the disabled, and the disadvantaged.
31. GREENWOOD-MOLINA NURSERY SCHOOL provides nonprofit day care of pre-school age children of working parents and parents in training programs.
32. INGLESIDE SALVATION ARMY provides emergency care to transients and homeless individuals and families; offers counseling; transportation; and emergency relief to the troubled.
33. JEWISH COMMUNITY COUNCIL OF CORPUS CHRISTI fosters and develops Jewish community life, carries on activities in the interest of the total community, and provides a common meeting ground for discussing matters pertaining to the general welfare of the community including center-guided leisure time activities for all ages and informal education.
34. JIM WELLS COUNTY CHAPTER, AMERICAN RED CROSS offers assistance to servicemen and their families and to veterans. Water safety and first aid classes are also taught and the chapter has 24-hour emergency telephone coverage.
35. JIM WELLS COUNTY CRIPPLED CHILDRENS ASSOCIATION provides financial help to families in the Jim Wells area in the care of physically handicapped children.
36. KINGSVILLE BOYS' CLUB serves over 500 boys aged 8 to 18. A game room, physical fitness program and arts and crafts are offered for the development of boys.
37. KINGSVILLE SALVATION ARMY provides emergency care to transients and homeless individuals and families; offers counseling, transportation and emergency relief to the troubled in the Kingsville area.
38. KLEBERG COUNTY COUNCIL OF CAMP FIRE GIRLS provides a learning-by-doing program that permits wide choice and encourages creativity and imagination. It seeks to develop the potential of each girl.
39. KLEBERG COUNTY FAMILY GUIDANCE SERVICE provides counseling to individuals and families in the Kingsville area; also provides education program in the area of family life and other human relationships; provides consulting services for schools and for professionals in the mental health field.
40. KLEBERG-KENEDY COUNTIES CHAPTER, AMERICAN RED CROSS gives service to military families and veterans. Water safety and first aid are taught and uniformed volunteers perform a variety of duties at the Naval Air Station.
41. MONEY MANAGEMENT COUNSELING & SERVICES provides help for persons in our community having difficulties with budgeting, indebtedness, or simple money management.
42. NEIGHBORHOOD CENTERS OF CORPUS CHRISTI provides educational, recreational, social and medical facilities for the improvement of living conditions of area residents; develops character and leadership in the members of the group and encourages their civic interest
43. PORTLAND SALVATION ARMY provides emergency care to transients and homeless individuals and families; offers counseling, transportation and emergency relief to the troubled in the Portland area.
44. ROBERT L. MOORE COMMUNITY CENTER provides day care for pre-school children 2-6 and after school ages 6-12; health care services

made possible by the City-County Health Dept.; Family Planning; social services and activities for a variety of needed programs in the area.

45. ROBSTOWN DAY CARE CENTER provides safe and adequate day care for mothers who are employed or otherwise unable to care for their children.
46. ROBSTOWN LITTLE LEAGUES (3) provide summer recreation provide summer recreation programs for boys and girls in the Robstown area.
47. ROBSTOWN SALVATION ARMY provides emergency care to transients and the homeless; offers counseling, transportation and emergency relief to the troubled in the Robstown area.
48. RURAL ECONOMIC ASSISTANCE LEAGUE, INC. provides a nutritional meal to the elderly participant as well as nutrition education, counseling, shopping assistance, recreation, outreach, transportation escort and information and referral.
49. SAN PATRICIO COUNTY CHAPTER, AMERICAN RED CROSS maintains disaster plans providing relief and rehabilitation from unforeseen disasters. Other programs include services to Military, first aid, water safety, youth services and home nursing.
50. SOUTH TEXAS PLANNED PARENTHOOD CENTER provides programs that contribute to the health, stability and happiness of family life and the individuals comprising the family. Provides general and technical education on the value of planned parenthood and by helping to create public opinion favorable to it.
51. SOUTH TEXAS SPEECH, HEARING AND LANGUAGE CENTER analyzes and diagnoses individuals with speech and hearing pathology; carries out remedial procedures on such persons; publicizes information about speech and hearing problems; establishes classes and/or schools for pupils with speech and hearing defects; and deals with any phase of disorders of communication.
52. TEXAS UNITED COMMUNITY SERVICES, INC. strives to achieve the greatest good for people throughout the State by sharing with other public and private bodies in planning and coordinating human service activities and by helping in the implementation and financing of such programs including United Way campaigns. 8th and Brazos St., Austin.
53. UNITED WAY OF THE COASTAL BEND assists volunteers in conducting a fund raising campaign, and reviewing programs of member agencies and recommending levels of funding from the United Way; assists agencies with problems encountered in performance of services; and assists other planning groups to serve the people in the Coastal Bend.
54. VOLUNTARY ACTION CENTER OF THE COASTAL BEND serves as a clearinghouse for volunteers desiring to work with nonprofit agencies. Recruits, provides training and recognition of volunteers according to community needs.
55. WESLEY COMMUNITY CENTER - an agency of social concern committed to operating on the belief that a neighborhood organized around its own interests and needs can do much to confirm personal dignity. Provides day care, after school care, special education, school dropout programs, and day camping.
56. YOUNG MEN'S CHRISTIAN ASSOCIATION OF CORPUS CHRISTI provides character building programs, health and physical education programs and opportunities for Christian Fellowship and Leadership growth to all members.
57. YOUNG WOMEN'S CHRISTIAN ASSOCIATION provides personal development and opportunities for women and girls of diverse experiences and faiths to join together in the struggle for peace and justice, freedom and dignity for all people.

INTERNATIONAL SERVICE AGENCIES

58. SAVE THE CHILDREN - works in partnership with families and communities throughout the world to better the lives of impoverished children through programs in health, education, nutrition and agriculture.
59. INTERNATIONAL HUMAN ASSISTANCE PROGRAMS (IHAP) - fights poverty worldwide at the village level, where 80% of the poor live, through self-help community development programs in food, health, training and income generation.

60. PLANNED PARENTHOOD-WORLD POPULATION - helps needy couples have children when, and if, they want them. Supporting world-wide programs serves to improve the quality of life and reduces population pressures.

61. CARE - fights hunger, poverty, illiteracy and disease, focusing first on children, in 37 developing countries through aid and self-help development programs for the world's neediest people.
62. PROJECT "HOPE" - 21 years of building healthier and better lives for millions through responsive health education programs, meeting tomorrow's needs at its new Health Sciences Education Center.
63. INTERNATIONAL RESCUE COMMITTEE (IRC) - provides emergency aid for refugees who escape from religious, racial or political persecution and resettles them in free countries. IRC also helps uprooted war victims.
64. HELEN KELLER INTERNATIONAL - a technical assistance agency working to prevent blindness and to alleviate the problems of the blind in the developing world through education and rehabilitation services.



65. UNITED CEREBRAL PALSY ASSOCIATIONS IN TEXAS - support research and professional training, provide rehabilitation services and life enrichment programs for cerebral palsied children and adults throughout Texas.
66. MARCH OF DIMES - To prevent birth defects, the March of Dimes initiates and supports needed medical services, research and education. Birth defects strike a quarter-million infants annually
67. THE NATIONAL KIDNEY FOUNDATION - seeks the total answer for prevention, treatment and cure of kidney disease through patients services, research, legislation, professional and public education.
68. THE AMERICAN HEART ASSOCIATION - is dedicated to reducing premature death and disability from heart attack, stroke and related diseases through research, education and community service projects.
69. THE MUSCULAR DYSTROPHY ASSOCIATION - is dedicated to finding the causes of and cures for some 37 neuromuscular diseases while providing the best available care - free - to patients and their families
70. THE AMERICAN DIABETES ASSOCIATION - serves the nation's ten million diabetics through patient, professional and public education and major research projects aimed at care, control and cure for diabetes
71. THE TEXAS SOCIETY TO PREVENT BLINDNESS - offers a comprehensive program of free vision screening, Home Eye Tests for preschoolers, glaucoma screening, education and research—all aimed at preventing needless blindness.

75. THE NATIONAL SOCIETY FOR AUTISTIC CHILDREN - is dedicated to the education and welfare of all children with severe disorders of communication and behavior.
76. THE NATIONAL RETINITIS PIGMENTOSA FOUNDATION - is the only organization funding research and counseling programs to find a treatment and cure for blinding retinal degenerative disease affecting hundreds of thousands of children and adults worldwide.
