Eggers Under Full Head of Steam

At a time of the summer when most politicians are relying on the comfort of their "the Labor Day campaign kickoff will come soon enough" remarks, Republican gubernatorial nominee Paul Eggers is plowing ahead with a full head of steam.

Eggers told San Antonians this past week, "I cannot afford the luxury of waiting until fall to start my campaign."

Since May, Eggers has been pushing a "hit 'em fast, hit 'em hard'' campaign strategy. The only letup he plans before the Nov. 3 general election, when he will face Democrat Preston Smith for the second time, is an early September quail hunt.

Eggers is trying to build up a tidy nest egg for the campaign by getting supporters committed early to his candidacy. "If we should lose the election only because we were short a low dollars, it would be tragic," he said.

With a much more serious attitude than that of 1968, when he was new to the political scene," Eggers is confident he will be Texas' first Republican governor since Reconstruction. His latest poll shows him with 40 per cent of the vote, compared to 45 for Smith. The comparable poll for the comparable time in 1968 showed 20 and 65 per cent.

London paper recently predicted Eggers would be elected).

"The climate is right" said Eggers. "If we miss this opportunity in the Republican party, we will never forgive ourselves."

Otherwise, what is different in campaigning for the governorship in 1970 than in 1968?


"More organizations," retorted Eggers without a blink.

"Everyplace we go, we find that there is an organization for everything-in many places, they are over-organized."

This especially is true with Mexican-American groups. Although Eggers several months ago announced he wanted to bring the Mexican-American groups into his main organization, Eggers apparently has not been successful fully with this effort.

In Bexar County, for instance, there are competing GOP organizations of Mexican-Americans. Eggers has been able to work with each group effectively, he said, but he does wish they were together. This makes it easier in the realm of philosophy, as well as making personal appearances.

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R epublican gubernatorial candidate Paul Eggers of Wichita Falls said today he would like to see the creation of both an economy commis-sion and an environmental control board.

control board. "Upon becoming governor, I will appoint an economy com-mission, and during the first year it would go through the entire range of state agencies, hospitals and colleges to determine how we can cut down on the expense of gov-ernment," he said.

Eggers arrived in San An-gelo this morning, and will leave Thursday to attend the State Bar Convention in San Antonio. His itinerary here in-cludes a speaking engagement at the South Side Lions Club tonight tonight.

tonight. A political newcomer in 1968, Eggers received more than 1,250,000 votes for gov-ernor — the greatest number in Texas history for any Republican candidate. In his hard hitting at gov-ernment reforms, Eg-gers relied on his-experience in Washington as general counsel to the Treasury De-partment, which includes the Internal Revenue Service and. the Narcotics Bureau among other treasury divisions. He also draws on his ex-

He also draws on his ex-pertise as the head of a nine-member law firm in Wichita Falls that specialized in cor-lorate tax law in such areas as the oil and gas and banking

"I have found in ny cam-paign travels that people are just fed up with taxes — work-

ing people, housewives, busi-nessmen everywhere," Eggers

said. "I think the tendency in government is to talk in terms of taxes — how much addi-tional tax money is going to be required," he said. "My policy is to talk in terms of how can we still give the services without adding additional tax-

Eggers said that President Nixon cut the budget by \$91/2 billion in 1969. "We in treasury cut back our budget too,but at the end of the year, we still

at the end of the year, we still rendered the same amount of services." Eggers recommended the creation of a state en-vironmental control board "because the problems (of air, water and land pollution) are all entertwined." "We need to look at our state laws and see if they are satisfactory to take care of pollution. We have a lot of ex-ceptions in our pollution laws, and you can't have exceptions

without having pollution," he said. "An individual communi-ty should have the right to set more stringent standards than are set out in the state law. This would give each commu-nity the opportunity to face the peculiar problems that ex-ist in that area. Houston's pro-blems are just different than San Angelo's."

Eggers harked back to his experience on the President's Task Force on Narcotics and Dangerous Drugs.

Dangerous Drugs. "We recommended that something be done in the area of marijuana. There was sim-ply no scientific information in this area at all. The President went to Congress and there was a special bill passed. Now there is money for research in this area," he explained. "As soon as this information

"As soon as this information is available, it should be dis-seminated to the public in the same manner that information on the dangers of cigarette smoking is disseminated," Eg-mars said gers said.

Eggers also spoke in favor of "improving our vocational and technical training schools."

schools." He also said he favored "revenue sharing where mon-ey comes back to the state and San Angelo with no strings attached (from the federal government)." "Our method of compiling our state budget also needs to be reformed," he added, "par-ticularly the elimination of the joint conference committee method where new items are included in the budget at the conference level without ever having been discussed by the House and Senate."

the Department of Public Safety and local officers, Eggers said he would not hesitate to call out the Guard to help state and lo-c al law enforcement agencies maintain order and prevent loss of life and property. "If the guard is called out, it must be able to defend itself, particularly a g a i n s t sniper fire," Eggers told a H o u s t o n area group of supporters at a

reception honoring him Friday n i g h t. "While all Guardsmen need not have a shell in the c h a m b e r of their rifle at all times, they should carry live ammunition on their belts. More-

ammunition on their belts. More-over, the Guard should have well-trained sharpshooters t o deal swiftly and effectively with snipers." In addition, the Republican candidate said, all state military forces should be well trained in rlot control, and units near cam-puses should have special train-ing in the field.
