## Mimenes Challenges San Felipe Seniors

"The doors have been flung wide open and now the Mexican-American must make his greatest contribution and perhaps his greatest sacrifice," Vicente T. Ximenes told the 75 graduating seniors of San Felipe High School and the capacity crowd at San Felipe Memorial Stadium Tuesday night at the 34th graduating commencement exercises of the school.

Ximenes, a consultant from the Office of Economic Opportunity in Washington, D.C. and a native Texan of Mexican-American extraction, delivered the main address after an introduction by Dr. Fermin Calderon, describing and outlining the potential of the graduating class in his chosen subject for the evening, "War on Poverty".

J.B. Pena, superintendent of the San Felipe Independent School District, gave the welcome and at the same time urged the parents of the graduates to aid their sons and daughters to continue their education to the highest level possible.

Daniel Rivas, president of the school's board of trustees, presented the diplomas to the seniors.

The traditional key presentation was made by president of the senior class Raul Villarreal to junior class president Eloy Padilla.

Presentation of scholarships and awards was made by high school principal, Simon Ramon.

The invocation was given by Eddie Barrera and the benediction by Rebecca Hernandez.

The San Felipe Mustang Band, directed by Raul Machado, provided the music for the processional and recessional marches.

The class sang the senior farewell song worded by Supt. Pena with the theme taken from 'Moon River'.

Ximenes said that the war on poverty as it relates to the Mexican-American from Texas was probably best explained by President Johnson in his voting rights speech of a few weeks ago.

He said it was the first time a president of the United States had bared his innermost thoughts and said, "My first job after college was as a teacher in Cotulla, Texas, in a small Mexican-American school My students were poor, and they often came to class without breakfast and hungry. And they knew even in their youth the pain of prejudice. They never seemed to know why people disliked them, but they knew it was so because I saw it in their eyes."

The President continued with "It never occurred to me in my fondest dreams that I might have the chance to help the sons and daughters of those students, and to help people like them all over this country. But now I do have that chance. And I'll let you in on a secret — I mean to use it."

Ximenes, a discharged major in the Ai rForce, said that war on poverty was exactly what it said.

it said.

"War on poverty is not a welfare program. It is a self-help program. The war on poverty is a program to help institutions and entire communities view and treat the Juan Garcias and the Senora Marias in a very different way — as a citizen, as an American," Ximenes continued.

The author of a number of economic publications on the state of New Mexico told the senior class that the main thing they would have to offer a community project would be their ideas and their talents.

"You will not offer material

"You will not offer material goods because the war on poverty is not a welfare program. You would not distribute money because there is none to distribute. But you would, because of your education and talent, help Juan Garcia to gain his dignity by improving his skills," he added as at times he brought out key points of his address in Spanish.

Ximenes said that from three years of experience and working in Ecuador, South America, that here was a great resource and a great chance for the

people of Mexican-American extraction to help in the war on poverty in such South American countries as well as other parts of the world.

of the world.

"I am not saying that the people that are now helping — and when I say helping, I mean literally feeding people dying from starvation — are not doing a fine job. They are doing the best they can. I say that people who have faced and know this, could certainly do a great and fine contribution to the war on poverty

to the war on poverty.

Ximenes closed with a quote from the late President Kennedy saying that it seemed appropriate now that we have

actually begun his program. Quoted from a speech made by the late President was, "Now the trumpet summons us again, not as a call to bear arms though arms we need — not as a call to battle though embattled we are, but a call to bear the burden of a long twilight struggle, year in and year out rejoicing in hope, patient in tribulation — a struggle against the common enemies of man: tyranny, poverty, disease and war itself."

After the exercises the local American G.I. Forum honored Ximenes, the school board of trustees and others at a reception at the forum building.

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
