This is a belated reply to your latter in reference to John Y. Harding. I have received a number of requests for executive clemency, and am very sympathetic to Mrs. Herding.

The board considered this case last month, at which time it was felt that since the prisoner had then served only about 20 days of his sentence, it was not deemed feasible to recommend executive clemency.

However, I have told the parties who have written in Mr. Harding's behalf that if favorable recommendations can be secured from the sentencing officials, them perhaps by late summer or early fall the board will look with favor upon recommending clemency in this case. It is my understanding that this will in all likelihood be done in time for Mr. Harding to take up his school duties for the next term.

I appreciate your interest in Mr. Harding's case, and assure you of my desire to be helpful whenever possible and feasible.

Dear John:

This will acknewledge our telephone conversation of last week and your request concerning John Y. Harding W/M 53593, who is currently serving a three year sentence for embezzlement in the Arkansas State Penitentiary.

I have discussed this matter with Mr. W.O. Ball, Director of the Board of Pardons and Paroles and he will request that the Board hear these people from Poteet, Texas who desire to appear in his behalf; however, since Harding has only been in the Penitentiary since January 16, 1962, I feel it only fair to warn you that the trip and expenses will probably be completely unnecessary. Also, there is the matter of the county officials, who do not feel it justified to recommend clemency. Their case was taken to the Arkansas Supreme Court which upheld the lower courts decision. I hope this makes our situation clear, as I do not feel there is any hope or chonce for clemency of any type at this time.....

Any time I can be of assistance in any way don't hesitate to call on me.

I regret that I have not had an opportunity to meet with you and the people from Rteet about t is case. As you understand, of course, I have been away from the office for a number of meetings and speaking engagements, and this letter is being dictited while I am en route in West Texas.

As evidenced by the attached letters, however, we have been doing all that we can to help on this case. You will note that the chances for release appear much better late this summer or in early fall than they do at the present time. In view of this, I frankly believe that it may do more harm than good to push the matter at this time, but I will be glad to work ith you and your consituents on whatever you suggest.

I will be away from the office most of the time during the coming weeks, but if you desire to discuss the matter further, I would suggest that you talk to John Goldsum who is my Assistant in charge of clemency. As you probably know, too, I will be in Poteet on April 14 for the annual strawberry festival, and we may have a chance to discuss the matter at that time.
