Maria likes to ride, but camot because of the Indians. "some most agreeable rides on horseback I undertcok, accomparied by my husbard and Mr Gilpir along the shomes of the Bay. Because of the greater delight cone chocses the evening..."

But: "In spite of the awful heat cluring the day, the meadows are covered with the most lukuriant grass, which gives a wonderful sight! As far as you can see this fresh green turf with single clumps of trees. And as I inceed am such a great favorite of mice arimals, it also please me to see masses of horses ard cows jumping along on it so in liberty."

Maria makes trousers for Felix wut of linen mangling-cloth. "And for myself I make from the ondinary garments skirts, which, fom frequent want of my chambermaid-my husband--is more easily put or, but this, too, goes on very well. Now I shall became milliner tocy as I am abcut to make me a winter hat."

Advises Eunterbirdens "to bring alcmg for themselves a rather complete kitchen-Furniture, for at New Orleans they are most scantily previded with it." Couldr"t get morters, or sieves, or coffee-drums. "Even if you buy a cooking-machine, you get quadrangular tin-bowls for frying pans. With part of the money he was to receive for the journey to Fasc Felix intended to build a kitchen with cocking-machine, etc. separated from the house by a covered passage. Now this must still be left for a while. It is not agreeable to have the kitchem rear the rooms because of the flies, heat, amd smoke. Expresses bad epimiom of Americans. "... and moreover immensely given to drimk. Therefore I live quite for myself..."" Lonely when Felix is away.
re: servants: "But it is impossible to get anyone. Mexican women mever work more than they have urgertly to do for their house. Anericar women of the class prefer to say in a big town and there is mo one at all in service here. A German girl came here some weeks ago and alsa at cone ahd $E-g$ places where to enter. She chase the one where she most probably gets [the best] wages...

Moreover I can give you the holy affirmation that a change of my situation, may it ever appear so advantageous in outward respect, will never be welcome to me as socrs as it might separatee my husband and myself.... And believe me, the conditions in regard of the Red Indians will certainly turn favorable, so that my husband will be able to build on our land and that then he will at ance give up the surveyon business."

She asked for advice re: babies. "....the local mamer to clothe childrer, which, however, seems to me really most disagreeable. Instantly after the birth it gets a little linen sash rourci......." Thought their way better: "n...wrap them in a somewhat long covering and put the comners, round,..." Claims here everything is dore "superficially and megligently.". Ars whether it is mot urwholesome to
the child if the right over it is mot made dry and cleared." Recommended ar American woman, mother of 8 , to come instead of a doctor. Mad. Meuly had her. "Mad. meuly is a really rice womar of eld years, who got married with 15 years. . She visits me sometimes, and I, toa, go to her."
re: her newly added rocm:
Felix cleared it for her when he found her clearing it before she put her things in it. "...and thus he is always intent on making me every little pain easy. In the moming he gets up early quite noiselessly and kindles the fire for me, puts water up, brings me washing-water inta the rocm, encugh, treats me with the greatest care."
"I have absolutely free will to do as I like, my husband always put up with arything. Never, rever does he blame arything in the food, even if it had not turned out well. On the contrary he always says it tastes very fine thus, I just like it, and to prove it to me, he eats so much of it as if it tasted him excellently. If orice I should not cook at all, I know he would say that is quite right and reasonable and if then he didn't get anything but a bit of bread."
"Here it is not so easy to write a letter. Ore always has to fight against great incorverierces: heat or strong wind and flies, among which some distinguish themselves especially to place themselves in the eyes, ears on on the nose." In the kitchen, because of the heat, she wore a shirt, with buttons, "grass-cloth petticoat, and light cottor skirt without waist."

It is very armoying that people here have almost no money and of course do mot pay the work, either. Now two comparies of soldiers will come to Corpus by which it will probably come into fashion to some extent."

So with this lass of income, Felix consented to go even though he considered it low pay. "At the former time he became lighter by 30 pounds, them in the beginming of this m morith still had a bilicus fever during which he was so weak that he scarcely could move a limb....[still] loking awfully miserable. In comsideration of this I offered him my whole private property if he does not go away. But as this consists of $e$ gald dollars anly, he of course has preferred are hundred."

Next day" "since yesterday the intention ta go to Pasa del Aguila has changed. They did not grant them the military escort now. Eecause of the great number of Red Indians that stay in the surroundings they camot miss amy soldiems. ...

Eut just on that day my husband was lying very sick and had taken a vomitive on the day befome. They say it had been very rice, and they have been together till the early morring."

"Fontunately Felix was with all vates reelected surveyor", thus at least this income will remain for us. Sometimes my husband is crosstempered; for all the work with the land [the rancho?] has beers in vairg and he had to have the man for it as well as if everything had thriven wel.1."
"Since Mrn Eusse is no longer in our house, it is much better, and we now also are on quite good footing with him."
"Father asked abcut our divine service. We have mo church here, it is true, but every Surday there is English or Sparish and mosty Cathalic service. Though I have not yet been there, I did not forget Gcd. .."
