

Blazon of Arms



"VON BLÜCHER"

Arms: Gules, two keys in pale addorsed wards upwards argent.

Crest: Out of a ducal coronet two keys in saltire argent.

The family name of VON BLÜCHER is German in origin. The name is derived from one who came from Blücher in Mecklenburg. Some variants: Blücher, Blucher, etc.

Traditional meanings of above heraldic colors: Gules(red)-signifies fortitude; Argent(white or silver)-peace, serenity. Traditional meanings of above heraldic charges: Keys-knowledge, authority, mystical power; In pale(placed vertically)-denotes military strength & fortitude; Ducal coronet-victory; In saltire (placed in the form of the cross of St. Andrew)-perseverance in a true purpose, suffering for a faith, and an endurance of hardships.
